WASC - Student Council News Story

A purpose of Student Council is to help their community as well as their school. The Cody High School Student Council extended their giving this year to other communities in distress. The devastating shooting in Tucson, AR, impacted the CHS Student Council to act. Christina Green, the nine-year-old girl who died in the shooting, was a Student Council member at her school, Mesa Verde Elementary School. Mesa Verde Elementary School created the Christina-Taylor Green Memorial Scholarship in memory of her. CHS heard about the scholarship and decided to help by raising money. Called "Tuesday for Tucson", jars were placed in the main office and we raised \$350 in one day. Because of the amount raised for Tuesday for Tucson, CHS Student Council made a move to unofficially begin Wish Week a little earlier. If every student and faculty member brought one dollar, they could raise \$(2600). St. Patrick's Day was the designated day to "Bring Your Green". Student Council members went to every classroom with a bag and students and teachers were asked to give a dollar or any change from their pockets. \$(2600+) was collected that day. Wish Week was from April 11 to April 15 and includes May 3 and 4. CHS' Wish Kid is J.D. from Riverton who wishes to meet the creator(s) of the Halo video games. The themes used were sushi day, plaid day and Halo day. His wish has been fulfilled, and a second wish is nearly funded - for Rahne from Riverton, who would like to meet Tinkerbell. One of the highlights of our Wish Week was JD's participation in the opening assembly, which also included visits from previous Wish Kids Skylah and Samantha.

This year, our family was faced with the hardest obstacle we have ever come to face. Harder than organizing any blood drive, than collecting any number of cans, than being under any kind of time crunch to complete WASC paperwork or plan Homecoming. On March 19th, 2011, we heard the news that would change our lives forever. On this date, our Student Body President, Taylor William Bear affectionately known as "T-Bear", passed away as a result of a self-inflicted gun shot wound.

Words cannot express the shock, hurt, and devastation not only our school but our community feel. T-Bear was the most influential, caring, and talented person any of us have ever known to walk the CCHS hallways. The world lost an amazing person, brother, son, friend, and athlete. T-Bear had such a bright future; he was a 3X State Wrestling Champion, All-American, and President not only of our Student Body but also of our school's chapter of National Honor Society. It is difficult and for us to understand why he would make such a final decision, nor not ask for any help to prevent this from happening, but as a student council we are working to increase Suicide Awareness and Prevention within our school to help prevent tragic situations like this from happening in the future.

We do not plan to focus on the negative; instead we want everyone to remember the great impact T-Bear had on all of us during his life. He could brighten anyone's day with his kind words, and anyone who knew him knows that he had the most contagious smile ever seen. We will never forget the great memories we have made.

We know T-Bear would have wanted us to continue to do our best in improving our school and community. As a family, we have come together even more through these tough times to finish the year off with our second food drive, several Make-A-Wish fundraisers, a 1st Annual Talent Show, as well as street clean-ups and an End of the Year Celebration in the future.

All of this would not be possible without the outpouring of support we have received from across the state. Words can not express how grateful our council, school, and community truly are for helping us cope with our loss.

Special thanks go out to Kelly Walsh Student Council, Sheridan Student Council, and Natrona Student Council. Your kind words and support are so much appreciated. We also would like to thank the numerous wrestling teams from across the state that came to show their support at Taylor's service.

All we ask is to continue to keep the Bear family, our student council family, wrestling family, and our community in your thoughts and prayers during this difficult time. We know the rest of this school year, as well as next year will be hard for us, but we also know with the support of our community, our state, and each other we can make it through.

Lingle-Ft. Laramie High School has had a busy year with community service projects. We've hosted two blood drives and the one held in April brought in 35 units of blood. We had good participation from our students and also had parents and staff members donate. It is really a worthy cause

Student council served free popcorn and we had 60% of our student body attend. It got pretty cold before the movie ended but nearly everyone stayed. Lyman High School Student Council and the participating student body just experienced the most touching and successful wish week we have yet to see. We started the week off with an assembly, highlighting two kids living in our valley who went on their very own Make-a-Wish adventure. One of the kids was actually at the assembly, and stepped out of his shell to tell the whole high school about his experience going to Disney World to meet Mickey Mouse, Woody, and Buzz Lightyear. Most everyone present was choking back tears as his smile lit up the room while watching a slide show of the dream he and his family were able to live out. With his sweet spirit and the other boy's amazing story as our motivation, the school was fired up to raise more money than ever raised before by Lyman High School. We ultimately wanted to defeat last year's accomplishment of \$1200. We had a lot of different activities throughout the week to raise money and awareness, including selling Make-a-Wish stars. The buyer could sign the star, which was then hung on a huge heart in the display case in the school's commons. Student Council also hosted a silent dessert auction at our big rival basketball game. Our largest success of the week was the school-wide coin drive. We designated a jar for each class. The class that came out on top with the most points won. The money count of the change in the jar added points; however, paper money in the jar subtracted points. For instance, two quarters in a jar are worth 50 points, but a dollar bill subtracts 100 points.

There was an intense bout between the juniors and seniors, as the juniors decided to put their foot down after being beaten at every other school competition by the seniors. In the end, the juniors emerged victorious at last (but the seniors DID have more money in their jar... just sayin'...). With the coin drive alone, we were able to come up with over \$2800, and our final total was \$3200. We were so impressed with all of the effort our student body put forth, we provided free donuts and hot chocolate at break the following Monday, along with a long lunch the next Tuesday. We're so proud to be able to say we more than doubled our school's fundraising last year, and have the utmost confidence in the Make-a-Wish foundation to put our hard work and money to great use. Riverside High school Student Council (Basin) established a goal to raise \$2000 for charity this year. Last year, the council established that we donate our charity funds to a variety of local and national fundraisers, rather than just to the Make a Wish Foundation.

So far, we have \$370 for Make a Wish. During Spirit week, we charge a dollar for hats for students and jeans for teachers. We also encourage donations from our elementary and middle school.

We are once again giving a majority of the funds to the Haiti Relief fund and have raised \$720 so far, part of which has already been sent. We "trick or treat" for UNICEF annually and designated our funds to Haiti. \$400 was earned during Valentines when we ran a Crush for a Crush and Hugs and Kisses fundraiser. We deliver to all 3 schools which helps a lot.

During the Christmas week, we participate in Angels Trees and food baskets and at this point we have contributed \$240 to local charities.

In order to meet our \$2000 goal, we still need to raise \$670. We are planning to raise most of this during the upcoming Spring fling week. We will also most likely need to create another fund raiser to meet this goal.

We had auditions and put together 1.5 hour evening show featuring the best vocal, instrumental, dancing, juggling, and hip hop talent from East High School. We had over 100 people in attendance and all admission prices are being donated to Make-A-Wish. We are also doing a change drive for Make-A-Wish.

Another new fundraiser for East this year is the Burn Out Victims Fund. Our local fire department has a fund to help families who have had house fires and need some items replaced immediately. They have asked us to help them raise \$500. We have asked 4 teachers to be in a contest where the teacher who raises the most money will be pushed in the pool. We kicked off the event with a assembly honoring our firefighters.
